## *The Feast of Saint Matthew • 20 September 2015 at 9:00am* **150 YEARS OF FAITH**

Our 150th anniversary provides an opportunity to think about both our origins and our future. How our parish came to be established in San Mateo is a part of the much larger story of the steady expansion of the Christian faith throughout the world. All four gospel writers attempt to capture the enthusiasm of the early followers of Jesus and place the origins of the Christian faith in that context. In what is often called The Great Commission, the gospel writer Mark records the instruction of Jesus to, “Go into all the world and preach the gospel to the whole creation” (Mark 16:15). The gospel writer Matthew records a similar instruction: “Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit” (Matthew 28:19). The early church spread outwards from Jerusalem into surrounding regions. Christianity was eventually adopted as the official faith of the Roman Empire and spread throughout the ancient world. In 1492, the voyage of Columbus provided the first introduction of Christianity to the New World. The “lost colony” established in Roanoke in 1587 and the permanent settlement of Jamestown, which

followed in 1607, were the earliest English settlements in North America. Both paved the way for the Anglican strain of the Christian faith that took hold in the colonies. It is amazing to reflect that it took over 250 years for the Episcopal Church of St. Matthew to be established on the other side of the continent from where Christianity initially took root. History records that The Rev. Giles Alexander Easton held the first Episcopal services in San Mateo in a schoolhouse on April 24, 1864. Later that year, the baptism of George Henry Howard took place on the Feast of St. Matthew, September 21st, 1864. By June of the next year, one of several meetings were held to organize a parish and on October 15th, 1865, members of the fledgling parish gathered to lay the cornerstone of the original stone church. It is significant that our parish was established in San Mateo when the village consisted of less than a dozen houses. This founding action signaled that a life of faith would be found at the very center of an expanding community. The vision and vibrancy of the newly established parish became apparent when in short order St. Matthew’s established both a school and an orphanage. In the years that

followed, our parish was instrumental in planting other Episcopal churches on the Peninsula as well as helping to found the hospital next door. We have inherited an amazing legacy of serving our larger community while remaining a beacon of faith in the heart of San Mateo.



On September 20th of this year, when we gather to celebrate 150 years of faith on the Feast of St. Matthew, it will not be an accident that the service will include baptisms. In important and profound ways, this simple action reminds our entire community of our mission to embrace new Christians and support and equip them for their journey of faith. Part of that journey involves asking how we will serve others—and in what tangible ways we will make our faith visible beyond the walls of our church building. With one foot rooted in our rich past, our community steps toward the next 150 years of faith. I pray that our future will continue to be exciting, relevant and filled with joy—as new generations live out the gospel while making St. Matthew’s their spiritual home.

*From Waikiki to Santa Cruz via St. Matthew's Hall:*

**THE INTRODUCTION OF SURFING TO THE AMERICAS**

Sunday, July 19, 1885, Santa Cruz: As reported on Monday, July 20 in the early edition of the Santa Cruz Surf paper, "Sunday afternoon at the beach was one of the liveliest of the season. It was warm, very warm, but tempered by a breeze, which made the heat endurable and kept people good-natured."

At the mouth of the San Lorenzo River, history was about to be made. Three Hawaiian princes—David Kawanānākoa, Edward Keliiahonui and Jonah Kuhio Kalanianaʻole—were in the water with long surfboards made of local redwoods and milled in the shape of traditional Hawaiian *o'lo* boards, reserved in the Islands traditionally for royalty. Their uncle, King David Kalakaua, a renowned surfer at the long break along Waikiki Beach on the island of Oahu, had taught them this Hawaiian tradition that goes back 1000 years.

"The breakers at the mouth of the river were very fine and here occurred the very primmest of fun, at least, so said those who were 'in the swim.' As many as 30 or 40 swimmers were out in the water with them. The young Hawaiian princes were in the water, enjoying it hugely and giving interesting exhibitions of surf-board swimming as practiced in their native islands." This cultural activity, now a world-wide sport, was brought to the Americas via St. Matthew's by these three princes.

For the next 40 years the redwood *o'lo* boards that they rode in Santa Cruz would be duplicated, made of "first growth" redwoods from the Santa Cruz Mountains and then shipped

across the Pacific as the primary construction material for surf boards. The popular Hawaiian monarchs King David Kalakaua and his wife, Queen Consort Esther Julia Kapiʻolani, who were childless, adopted the three princes in 1884 after the deaths of their parents. The princes had been their nephews. They had attended Hawaii's finest schools. Now they were being prepared for the monarchy. David (nicknamed "Koa"), was the oldest born in 1868. In the fall of 1884, at the age of 16, he was sent to St. Matthew's Hall, "a full-fledged military school for boys, located in San Mateo, and founded by the stern and 'never smiling' Episcopalian taskmaster, Rev. Alfred Lee Brewer." The other two brothers soon followed. Fast forward 125 years: April 9, 2010, the City Council of Santa Cruz dedicated that day, "Three Hawaiian Princes Day". At Lighthouse Point, in front of the Santa Cruz Surfing Museum, there was a daylong event honoring the three Hawaiian Princes, David Kawanānākoa, Jonah Kuhio Kalanianaʻole and Edward Keliiahonui for introducing surfing to the Americas 125 years earlier. This event included the participation of royal descendants including granddaughter Princess Regina Kawanānākoa. And

after a traditional Hawaiian song was sung, a bronze plaque of the three princes in their St. Matthew's Hall Uniforms was unveiled. And now you know the rest of the story.

## Youth Ministry Adventures in SCARCITY AND ABUNDANCE

I've been thinking about food a lot. It's been on my mind: scarcity and abundance, locally grown and imported, satiation and hunger.

This summer I was blessed to spend close to two weeks with our youth exploring these issues.

It all began in June when we took five members of St. Matthew's Junior High Youth Group and Day School youth to Oakland. There we learned about food desserts, public assistance programs, different food pantry models, and food scarcity.

We got to learn about the food ministry of St. James Santiago. It has evolved over time to a client choice model, the aim of which is to "seek and serve Christ in all people," and "respect the dignity of every human being." We went to the Alameda County Food Bank where we learned about buying in bulk, the concept of salvage, and the importance of checking expiration dates. We cleaned and sorted and cleaned some more. Most importantly we got to meet the neighbors of St. James, some of whom volunteer in the pantry, and others of whom are clients. On the day of distribution we served over 200 family units, each unit having 3-12 members in the family. Every week the parishioners of St. James and some neighboring churches pull together, working tirelessly Monday-Wednesday in order to feed their community.

In August, ten youth from the combined high school youth group of St. Matthew's and St. Paul's went to work at Heifer Farm in Rutland, MA. Heifer International is well known in church communities for its "passing

on the gift campaign," wherein people can purchase a flock of sheep or a beehive and have it sent to a place in need where Heifer is at work. "Heifer works to eradicate poverty and hunger through sustainable, values-based holistic community development, by distributing animals, along with agricultural and values-based training, to families in need around the world as a means of providing self-sufficiency."

Farm to table took on new meaning when we gathered the eggs and



harvested the vegetables that we would get to eat. Even the yak-stuffed cabbage leaves were "fresh." We learned about world hunger, scarcity, food crises in our own country, how to tell organic and free range eggs from other eggs, how to milk goats and sooooo much more. The youth are eager to share their trip with you, and there will be opportunities in the months ahead to see photos and hear their stories.

In case you missed the Ivy Leaf, you should know that at our fundraising dinner, the Hammer Family generously offered the group \$500 dollars if I would....ehem..... kiss a cow. Faithfully, I held up my end of the deal, and our own Jack



McNally captured the photographic evidence of the lovely moment between Clover the Scottish Highlander and myself.

Our trip concluded with a tour of Boston. We visited Boston's oldest surviving church, Old North (Episcopal) Church, the location from which the famous "One if by land, and two if by sea" signal is said to have been sent, prompting Paul Revere's famous ride. We saw another historic Episcopal Church, Christ Church Cambridge, and Faneuil Hall. We grabbed lunch at America's oldest restaurant – Union Oyster House.

I want to express my sincere gratitude for all of your generous support both financially and spiritually, and especially my thanks to Luc McNally, one of our college students, who fearlessly and with great enthusiasm served as our male chaperone in Boston. Whoever said summers are boring was not involved in youth ministry! I'm grateful for the opportunity to learn and grow with these amazing young people, and proud of how they represented our parish in big and small ways, across the country and in our own Diocese. Their impact on the lives of others and animals was authentic and truly Christ-filled. As we propel into the program year, I am mindful of the many ways our youth can teach us, if we let them and if we listen. I hope you will join me in listening harder and learning from them as they help lead the way.

The Vestry feels that the discernment process around LGBT (lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender) welcome will allow us to better talk about how we welcome all people to St. Matthew’s and especially reflect on the needs of LGBT seekers.

This series will guide us through a period of education about what welcoming looks like in the context of our LGBT brothers and sisters.

The process was designed by Integrity USA, a nonprofit organization whose mission is to “inspire and equip the Episcopal Church, its dioceses, congregations, and members to proclaim and embody God’s all-inclusive love for LGBTQ persons and those who love them.”

To become a “Believe Out Loud” parish, a welcome statement is created. Currently the closest Episcopal Churches to St. Matthew’s

that have gone through this process are Good Shepherd (Belmont) and Epiphany (San Carlos). LGBT people looking for safe spaces to worship often refer to Integrity’s maps of supportive congregations when looking for a spiritual home. <http://www.integrityusa.org/welcoming-congregations>.


**SAVE THE DATE:
