THE JOURNEY TOWARD PARISH FINANCIAL HEALTH

Almost ten years ago, when I first arrived at St. Matthew's, the Vestry was in the midst of finalizing a new financial arrangement with our school. The search for a new model came in the wake of several years of conflict between our church and school. A dedicated team comprised of Vestry and School Board members surveyed a nationwide sample of Episcopal Churches that also had schools. Their detailed research found that a Shared Expense Model represented the best practice for maintaining a healthy and equitable financial relationship between a parish church and its school. The basic assumption of the Shared *Expense Model* is that each institution is responsible for sustaining its own staff and programs, while each entity bears the cost of facilities according to its actual use of the buildings and grounds. In the analysis leading up to the adoption of the Shared Expense Model it had become clear that over time our church had been relying, to an unhealthy degree, upon a disproportionate financial subsidy from our school. From my arrival at St. Matthew's, the financial challenge for our parish has

been to improve our revenue and to control our costs. Together we have begun a long-term journey towards financial health. Our challenge has been constant. Each year we have faced the tension caused by the knowledge that while deficit budgets are unsustainable in the long term, if you slash spending and cut out too much staff and programming too soon, you will greatly hinder your opportunities for future growth. Over the past ten years we have worked to achieve a judicious balance between the two extremes. Last year, we approved a parish budget with an almost \$50,000 deficit while also planning to draw more than 5% from our endowment funds. Your Vestry has committed to making steady progress towards a balanced (and in the long term sustainable) budget. This year, we will submit a budget with less than a \$25,000 deficit while holding our endowment fund draw to only 5%. In the year 2018, we hope to achieve a balanced parish budget. These numbers represent substantial progress! Improved financial stewardship has been an important component of our budget advances,

along with making prudent and sometimes difficult staffing decisions.



When I first arrived in 2007, one of the ideas proposed by the Vestry to gain budget efficiency was to combine the positions of Organist and Choir Director into a single staff position. For ten years we have resisted this option largely based upon personnel considerations. In December of 2016, after Adrian offered his resignation, I asked Philip Keil, our long-time organist, if he would consider filling the combined position. Philip has agreed to take on the role of Acting Organist and Choir Director in the short-term, with the possibility of extending the position into the future. Hyun Suk Jang (Suki) will continue her work with the Children's Choir, and we will be looking for someone to assist with the Bell Choir. This move of consolidation in the music program will help to stabilize our overall budget. When I arrived at St. Matthew's, the Assistant Rector (held by Beth Parab) was only a half-time position. In 2008 we were able to move the

position to 3/4 time, and in 2010 we took a plunge and moved the position to full time. The reasoning was venturing to provide additional programming and staffing to support parish growth. After several years of experience it has become clear that although our community appreciates the many benefits provided by a full time Associate Rector, it is just beyond what we can financially support as we move to a balanced budget. After careful consideration, our leadership has decided to hedge our bets for the year 2017. The budget calls for the Associate Rector position to return to 3/4 time in the fourth quarter (beginning October 1, 2017). If our financial position exceeds our projections, we could consider maintaining funding at the current level. This is the scenario that we will be working toward! If we remain on the current track, however, the 3/4 time position would become part of the 2018 budget for the full year. Over the past few years especially, I have been impressed by our leadership's dedication to putting us on the road to long term financial health. I believe that your Vestry has done a solid job in communicating our financial needs and emphasizing the importance of financial stewardship. We have not made hasty decisions and have adopted a long term view. I am thankful for the ongoing support of our entire parish and look forward to continuing to build our future together.

EPISCOPAL SUMMER CAMP





I was 7 years old when I went to sleep away camp for the first time. I was going with my best friend, and she was a year older than me. We were gathered with our parents in the parking lot of the old Levitz furniture store waiting for the bus. We piled on board and my friend started crying. Meanwhile I plopped on a seat and eagerly waved to my mom. My friend never came back - she got too scared and backed out. My mom asked if I wanted to back out, but I didn't. Off I went to Girl Scout Camp all by myself. During the five days I was up there, I spiked a fever and was rushed to the Emergency Room, it rained the whole time, and I fell and scraped my knee badly. When I returned home I eagerly recounted all of my adventures to my parents and begged them to let me go the following summer. With all the terrible things that happened that first year I should have not wanted to return. But camp is waaaaaay more than what you do at it or what the weather is like. Camp is a way for children and youth to grow into themselves. And Christian camp is a means by which they can develop more fully into their baptismal promises. In an article titled, "Does Camp Make a Difference?" (www.vibrant faith.org/blog), Dr. Jake Sorenson explores the benefits of Christian Summer Camp. From a survey of parents whose youth participated in camp programs, he found that:

- 92% of responding parents agreed that the camp experience clearly had an impact on their children;
- 89% said their child learned something new; and,
- 90% of parents agreed that their child grew in faith at summer camp.

Parents reported that children returned home "singing camp songs, asking to pray at the dinner table, full of self-confidence, and simply happier than before they went to camp." The same study revealed that camp offers a unique blend of five fundamental characteristics that are hard to recreate anywhere else:

intentional relationships

- emotional/physical safety
- distinct differences and separation from the home environment
- active participation
- faith interwoven throughout

We live in an area rich in resources when it comes to camp. Our Diocesan properties St. Dorothy's Rest and Bishop's Ranch offer distinct and unique camping experiences, including Ankle Biters (for the littlest Christians) and BREAD Camp (intentional leadership development for our teens). Our Diocese also runs Camp St. Francis. Camp St. Andrew's is another great choice, which is hosted at Camp Jack Hazard. Over the years, St. Matthew's children and youth have participated in all of these programs and many can help you discern which is right for your child or youth. Camp can be a life changing experience for children and youth. I know, because more than anything, camp helped mold me into the confident leader I am today. Don't let financial considerations get in the way of your child participating in the camp experience; talk to Father Eric or me, and we will work with your family to make sure that if your child wants to go to camp, he or she can. Register soon, because space is limited (I know it seems early). After 11 summers of camp, during which I spent 6 weeks in the redwoods, it still holds some of my warmest memories. Even though I went to secular camp, much of what I experienced was spiritually profound. I can only imagine the potential for spiritual transformation if I had attended an Episcopal summer camp. Close to 24 years later, I have buried a close camp friend's mom, celebrated with them in their marriages, and continue to remain connected to some of the most amazing women I have ever met. A good camp experience can not be replicated in school, at home or in church, so I hope you will take advantage of the opportunities available to us and consider registering today. Lindsav+

CONFIRMATION, RECEPTION AND RENEWAL OF BAPTISMAL VOWS

Confirmation is a sacramental rite of the church whereby the Holy Spirit, invoked at one's baptism, is strengthened. Confirmation usually happens between junior high and high school age, but adults may also be confirmed if they have not been confirmed in another tradition. People who have been baptized and confirmed in a different tradition are invited to be received. Reception is the rite wherein the Bishop acknowledges one's baptism and confirmation in a different Christian denomination and welcomes him or her into the Episcopal Church. Those who have been baptized, confirmed or received into the Episcopal Church, but have fallen away from their faith or desire to strengthen their commitments to Christ and his Church are invited to participate in the Renewal of Baptismal Vows. Historically, the time for preparation for these sacramental rites is the season of Lent. If you desire to go through preparation during this season of Lent, please contact the clergy, and they will let you know when the sessions will begin. The service of confirmation, reception, and renewal of baptismal vows will take place on June 3rd at Grace Cathedral in San Francisco.

My kids have been going to Camp St. Andrews for 10+ years. They started as campers and have now 'graduated' to be staff. I grew up going to 'church camp', and it was important to me to find a similar experience for them. Some of my fondest memories growing up were at camp, retreats, and mission trips; I forged life-long friendships and, more importantly, (while I didn't appreciate it then) I forged my spirituality in ways I never could by just going to church. When I researched Episcopal camps, Camp St. Andrews stood out because of its multi-generational roots - today the camp is run by the children and grandchildren of the founders. It is heavy on 'camp' (rustic lodgings, fun activities like archery and rock climbing and an overnight hike that invariably has rain) yet light on dogma. It lets the spirituality grow naturally, which is far more effective. In our house, the entire summer must be planned around the third week in July for CSA. The fact that CSA has become as important a part of my kids' lives as my camp was to mine is proof of the importance of these experiences. Every year my kids come back a little more mature, a little more engaged, and changed for the better. Oh and they get new socks out of it too! My CSA tradition is to buy them new socks while they are at camp because as soon as the filthy ones are jettisoned from the duffle bag, they are dropped into the trash. After the first year, I learned that the thought that I could get camp socks clean after a week in the Sierras was a quixotic pipe dream!
